Dear friends in Christ,

I just couldn't bring myself to preach this past Sunday afternoon. It's not as if I was unprepared. You see, I had worked up a short meditation on the gospel reading for the 5:00 p.m. Evening Prayer service and yet, when I clicked the Zoom link and was about to join the group, I couldn't muster the words to say anything.

I couldn't talk about Jesus and a story about something that happened 2,000 years ago - or say anything at all for that matter - because of the day's news coming out of Afghanistan, Haiti, and hospitals at home and throughout our country. I was having difficulty, to use the old preaching image, speaking God's truth while holding the newspaper in one hand and the Bible in the other. How do we hold the stories of each in our hands and find God's news?

While watching news footage of innocent people caught between collapsed buildings and collapsing governments, and reading the latest on the Delta surge, I could only ask "Where is God?" I was tempted to hunker down on the couch and isolate myself from others, behavior that has not served me well in the past. Perhaps you know the feeling? Faced with conflict - be it within ourselves, with others, or from the world - we may be tempted to throw up our hands, declare nothing can be done, and withdraw from others.

I did muddle through an impromptu meditation, which was laced with some frustration about the suffering of so many innocent people and, joining the psalmist, I repeated a portion of the psalm assigned for that night's service: "the eyes of all look to you [Lord] ..." (Psalm 145:15). Given my mood, it was more of a reminder to God that we are all down here looking for answers.

At the end of the service, when folks unmute themselves and join us for a virtual chat, a parishioner named my struggle in preaching on an ancient, prescribed text in the very moments of chaos and conflict: I was grieving. Soon, others spoke up and said they too were grieving and at a loss for words.

I could not solve the crisis in Afghanistan or Haiti, but in those few minutes of Evening Prayer, in such great company of God's faithful people, it was enough for us to be together and share our sorrow with one another. It was enough, if even for just a few minutes.

The parishioner who named my grief - and the grieving we were all just beginning - told us that he felt like brushing off Evening Prayer. That the moment seemed to big for yet another Zoom meeting. Instead, he decided at the last minute, and somewhat reluctantly, to join us - and it made all the difference in the world for him. In that moment. Just in that moment. To be with friends. To be church.

There are many times when conflict, uncertainty, or just plain old boredom can feel overwhelming, and isolating or "doing it on our own" feels more comfortable. It's in these moments when I feel most vulnerable that I really need you. Each and every one of you. Seeing you and hearing from you helps me more than you know. And I hope to be that for you. It's why Jesus built God's kingdom around a group of ordinary people - like you and me!

We are not in this alone. I hope to see you soon in church - be it in-person or by Zoom!


