From Fr. John

Perhaps because of the number of funerals I have been a part of since the COVID pandemic began, or perhaps just because of the number of people whom Donna and I have lost in the last couple of years; whatever the reason, I have been thinking a lot lately about loss.

Jesus said that there were two Commandments – Love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength. And love your neighbor as yourself. Here are couple of important reasons he said that. Human beings were made to worship God. That is why we were created, to worship our creator. And this God who created everything that is, does not want to be worshipped because we are afraid that we will be sent to hell if we don't worship God. No, this God wants us to worship because we love the Lord completely – heart, soul, mind, and strength. And that love should be reflected out to our "neighbors," those with whom we have relationships and those with whom we do not. But true love is not cheap.

When we risk truly loving other people, we become invested in their welfare. The kind of love that Jesus spoke of was what the Greeks called "Agape" (agápē). Agape is sacrificial love. It is love in action. It shows empathy. It desires and cares deeply about the good of the beloved. It wants what is best for the beloved. And it demonstrates good intentions toward all those who are loved. Jesus intended for his followers to extend agape to everyone.

It is not easy to love people with true agape. Loving this way means not always getting our own way. It means giving up something we want in order to ensure that someone else gets what they need. It means requiring us to act in the best interest of the other person — even when we would rather not. And it means showing empathy and understanding and extending grace, especially when it's hardest to do those things.

When we love with agape it deepens our other loves as well. It takes romantic love and the love of family members to deeper depths. When we love others deeply though, we risk the pain of losing that love. The loss of those we love, whether by death, or geography, or estrangement, can create lasting wounds that are difficult to overcome. But there is Good News in all this.

God knows and understands our pain. And just as we are to have agape for God and our neighbor, so does God have agape for us. Jesus promised us the Holy Spirit to be with us always, as our comforter, teacher, and guide. When you feel alone, empty, or left out, go to God in prayer. Call on the power of the Spirit. And call me. With the help of that same Holy Spirit, I will do my best to help you walk whatever difficult road you may be on. Oh ... one final thing. When you are feeling loss, go out and help someone else. It is amazing how much healing can come from showing agape to someone else who is in need.


Good Food Project Workday Saturday, October 1st 7:30am – 9:30am


