## From Fr. John

This Sunday is Ingathering Sunday for our Annual Stewardship Campaign. At both services, we will take our completed pledge cards and put them on the altar. There we will offer them to God as a means of giving back to God from that which God has given us.

As Judge Dee Drell wrote in a letter to the congregation, "Stewardship ... isn't just a call to bug you for money. It is not just an annual drive to fulfill a budget. Instead, it is a calling for you and for me to stop and remember that God is indeed in this effort. It is a request to us ... to commit to something much bigger than ourselves. It is a request to put the noise away for a little while and ask yourself the question of what stewardship of your LIFE should look like."

Lacee and Josh Brown stood up at the 10:30 service a couple of weeks ago and explained exactly what stewardship of their life looks like. They gave an incredible call for us all to return to God what God has given us: in giving of our (God-granted) time; in giving of our (God-given) abilities; and in giving of our (God-created) treasure.


Your fellow parishioners, have told you how God has moved them toward faithful stewardship of their lives, and how God has shown them that there is always More Than Enough, when we are faithful with God's generous resources.

The world today can be a scary place. There are many reasons for people to worry about the future. And worrying about the future leads us to grasp what we have more tightly, fearing that in the unknown future we will need everything we have, and more. But Jesus told us not to worry about tomorrow, telling us that we are to live our lives in the present, in certainty of the hope of salvation through him. The author of the First Letter to Timothy (6:17-19) told the recipient of his letter that he should:

"[C]ommand (the members of the community) not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on **God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment**. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, **so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.**"

We can only live "the life that really is life," if we lay our worries at the foot of the cross. And instead of living lives of stressful concern, we must walk in the footsteps of Jesus, living in humility, generosity, service, and love. There is always more than enough in the Kingdom of God. Until we fully usher in that Kingdom, let us live like it is already here. Open your hearts and hands to the God who opens Fatherly hands and heart to you. And give thanks for having More Than Enough.




## CHRISTMAS IN CENLA Friday, December 16, 2022 7:00pm

Featuring harp and strings, the concert will include selections from Tchaikovsky's *Nutcracker*, "Winter" from Vivaldi's *Four Seasons*, Corelli's "Christmas Concerto" and Marcel Grandjany's beautiful "Aria in Classic Style" for harp and string orchestra.


