From Fr. John

Over two millennia ago, in the village of Bethlehem (estimated population of 1,000), in what is today the Palestinian West Bank, a child was born. Even back in those days when every birth was a potentially hazardous event, the birth of a child was a pretty ordinary occurrence. So why do we remember and celebrate the birth of a baby boy, born to working-class parents who named him Yeshua (translated to Jesus), all these centuries later?

There are definite clues to answer that question in our Christian Bible. In the Old Testament, prophets spoke about him. Four Gospels tell the story of his life. Twenty-one epistles tell us various things about him — and in many cases, tell us how we should understand him as well. Scholars from the 1St Century CE through today have written innumerable books about him. I'm willing to bet that there were lots of Yeshuas born around the time of Jesus, but none are remembered as he is.

Here is the simple answer, from the Gospel of Luke: "Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid, for see, I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

To us was born on that day, the Savior — the Messiah, the Lord. Thanks be to God that little Yeshua, from incredibly humble beginnings, grew to be Jesus the Christ who saved the world from sin and death, and who has promised us eternal life in the heavenly dwellings made for us by our Father in heaven.

We gather together every year at this time, to celebrate and recognize the miracle that came into world on that first Christmas. For, "God so loved the world that God gave the only begotten Son, to the end that all who believe in him shall not perish, but have everlasting life."

I hope that you and yours have a Christmas that is as joyous as the occasion deserves. And may your New Year be one reflective of the love of God which Jesus called us to share with all those we meet.




Special Remembrances
