From Fr. John

It is a busy Holy Week at St. James. Yesterday morning we hosted the annual Chrism Mass, with renewal or ordination vows for all of the clergy of the diocese. Now we have: Wednesday evening Healing Eucharist; Maundy Thursday Eucharist with foot washing and stripping of the altar; the overnight vigil at the altar of repose; Good Friday Liturgy with Solemn Collects and Communion from the reserve; Meditations on the 7 Last Words of Christ; Stations of the Cross; Holy Saturday Liturgy; the Great Easter Vigil; and 2 Easter morning Holy Eucharist services. But why do we have all of these different services during this one week of the year?

The reason that we do all these things is to prepare us for the Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. During Holy Week, we do as much as we can, as often as we can, to make us all remember the horrors that our Savior lived through, on his way to the sacrifice that saved the world from sin and death. Easter is the most joyous of the Church's celebrations. And if we have gotten down into the terrible events of Holy Week and walked "the Way of the Cross" with Jesus, we can also fully and completely celebrate his victory over those events at the Easter services.

Please try to come to something (or more than one 'something') during this Holy Week. Consider the dedication to God reflected in Jesus' actions. And contemplate how horribly he was treated by human beings, before he "went down to the dead." I promise, it will make your Easter that much sweeter. And it will help you more deeply appreciate the sacrifice that brought rebirth to the world and the promise of everlasting life.

May you have a meaningful Holy Week, followed by a completely joyful Easter. Fr. John

MAUNDY THURSDAY VIGIL

Jesus said, "could you not stay awake with me one hour?" Matthew 26:40 (NRSV)

The Maundy Thursday (Thursday in Holy Week) liturgy is a very powerful one. But perhaps the most moving part of the service comes at the end, when the altar area of the church is stripped of everything that makes it look grand, and perhaps all that makes



it look "occupied." The end of the Maundy Thursday service reminds us of that place and time in which Jesus was arrested and taken away, leaving the Disciples alone. The period of time between The Last Supper and sunrise on Good Friday is commemorated by a Gethsemane Watch, or Maundy Thursday Vigil.

Know that there will be a Sheriff's deputy on premises all night for security. There will be reading and prayer resources available for those who participate.



Good Friday Offering

For 102 years, donations to the Good Friday Offering have directly supported ministries of the Anglican Communion Province of Jerusalem and the Middle East.

In a letter, Presiding Bishop Michael Curry talked about speaking to the Rev. Canon Faiz Basheer Jerjes and his colleague, Sinan Hanna, of St. George's Anglican Episcopal Church in Baghdad—the only Anglican church in Iraq. After
