From Fr. John

Some weeks, when a sermon doesn't immediately begin to come together for me, I will look back and see what I've said in the past. Last week I did that with Easter Day sermons. And I reread something that I preached in my second year of ordained ministry. Boy, does that seem like a million years ago.

I alternated between pride and embarrassment as I read my expression of systematic theology at that time. Occasionally, I said something that I would never say today. But also occasionally I said things that I absolutely stand by today. One of those things had to do with the Resurrection from the dead of our Savior.

What I wrote was, there is only one absolute requirement for anyone to make claim to being a Christian. A belief that Jesus died and rose from the dead. Theologians, apologists, and biblical scholars have argued and continue to do so today, about how and why that happened. But there can be no argument that a Christian believes that it happened.

The Fifty Days of Easter, the season in which we now find ourselves, is a time in which we should deeply consider what Jesus' rising to new life means for the world as a whole, and what it means for us, individually.

The last thing that I say before Communion distribution is: "The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that *Christ died for YOU*, and feed on him in your hearts, by faith, with thanksgiving." And *Christ ROSE for YOU*. Take some prayer and meditation time to think about what that really means.

May the God of Resurrection bring you new life. Fr. John


Through your generous we have not only provided hope for these families but also safety and a knowledge that someone really does care.

Our Prayers are with the Walker Family

Robert Raley Kirby, longtime resident of St. Petersburg, FL and active member of the community, died Wednesday, March 20, 2024.

Services for Mr. Kirby will be at 10 a.m. Tuesday, April 9th at St. Thomas Episcopal Church. Burial will be in Royal Palm Cemetery, under direction of Anderson McQueen.

Born June 9, 1947, a native of Duluth, MN, Kirby moved to St. Petersburg with his parents and sister in 1952. He attended Shorecrest, graduated from The Lawrenceville School, went on to study at Syracuse University, ultimately getting his undergraduate degree from Louisiana State University in 1973. He was accepted to Harvard Business School, where he graduated in 1975. During his educational years, Kirby volunteered to serve in the Vietnam War, where he completed a tour from November 1968 – November 1969. He served as a helicopter pilot and moved through the ranks and was honorably discharged as Captain with numerous decorations and medals, including a Purple Heart. His helicopter experience led to his love for flying, and he owned and flew planes for a significant portion of his life.

In 1970, he married Jane Randall Walker of Alexandria, LA, at St. James Episcopal Church, where he was a longtime member. He lived in Alexandria until 1990 and held positions at The Guaranty Bank and served as President and CEO of Red River Savings & Loan, along with other related business interests.

In 1990, he moved back to St. Petersburg where he would remain for the rest of life. He became a financial advisor and joined Raymond James where he worked for the balance of his career. He was a member of The Squires Club, The Polywogs and Rotary Club. He was a lifelong Episcopalian and joined St. Thomas Episcopal Church, where he served on the Vestry and enjoyed the Men's Bible Study Group. He loved sports and attended many games and events, especially Rays and Bucs games. He had a passion for hockey and was an avid Lightning Fan, having been a hockey goalie himself at both Lawrenceville and Syracuse. Since he was teenager he loved racing cars, both his own and watching other drivers in person during Formula One races. In his later years, he picked up softball and had a blast playing with the Gulfcoast Boomerangs in Gulfport.

Nothing was more important to him than his love for his family and attending family gatherings gave him the most joy. He is survived by two sons, Christian Walker Kirby of Fort Myers and Stephen Randall Kirby of Naples, two grandchildren Raley Robinson and Harper Jane, his former wife Jane Randall Walker Kirby of Highlands, NC, along with his beloved sister Heather Kirby Gehring of Palm Desert, CA and her two children Carsten and Christina, both of Minneapolis, MN.
